FIREARMS OR DESTRUCTIVE DEVICES--RECEIPT, 11 TRANSPORTATION OR POSSESSION BY CERTAIN PERSONS--PENALTY .--12 It is unlawful for the following persons to 13 Α. receive, transport or possess a firearm or destructive device 14 15 in this state: (1) a felon; 16 17 (2) a person subject to an order of protection pursuant to Section 40-13-5 or 40-13A-5 NMSA 1978; 18 19 or (3) a person convicted of any of the 20 following crimes: 21 battery against a household member 22 (a) pursuant to Section 30-3-15 NMSA 1978; 23 (b) criminal damage to property of a 24 household member pursuant to Section 30-3-18 NMSA 1978; 25

 restraining or other court order granted for the protection
 of a victim of domestic abuse;

OF PROTECTION .--

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A. Upon finding that domestic abuse has occurred or upon stipulation of the parties, the court shall enter an order of protection ordering the restrained party to:

(1) refrain from abusing the protected party or any other household member; and

7 (2) if the order is issued pursuant to this 8 section and if the court also determines that the restrained 9 party presents a credible threat to the physical safety of 10 the household member after the restrained party has received 11 notice and had an opportunity to be heard or by stipulation 12 of the parties, to:

(a) deliver any firearm in the restrained party's possession, care, custody or control to a law enforcement agency, law enforcement officer or federal firearms licensee while the order of protection is in effect; and

(b) refrain from purchasing, receiving,
or possessing or attempting to purchase, receive or possess
any firearm while the order of protection is in effect.

B. In an order of protection entered pursuant to
Subsection A of this section, the court shall specifically
describe the acts the court has ordered the restrained party
to do or refrain from doing. As a part of any order of
protection, the court may:

(1) grant sole possession of the residence 2 or household to the protected party during the period the 3 order of protection is effective or order the restrained party to provide temporary suitable alternative housing for 4 the protected party and any children to whom the restrained 5 party owes a legal obligation of support; 6 award temporary custody of any children (2)

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involved when appropriate and provide for visitation rights, child support and temporary support for the protected party on a basis that gives primary consideration to the safety of the protected party and the children;

(3) order that the restrained party shall 12 not initiate contact with the protected party; 13

(4) restrain a party from transferring, 14 concealing, encumbering or otherwise disposing of the other 15 party's property or the joint property of the parties except 16 in the usual course of business or for the necessities of 17 life and require the parties to account to the court for all 18 such transferences, encumbrances and expenditures made after 19 the order is served or communicated to the restrained party; 20

(5) order the restrained party to reimburse 21 the protected party or any other household member for 22 expenses reasonably related to the occurrence of domestic 23 abuse, including medical expenses, counseling expenses, the 24 expense of seeking temporary shelter, expenses for the 25

1 replacement or repair of damaged property or the expense of 2 lost wages;

3 (6) order the restrained party to participate in, at the restrained party's expense, 4 5 professional counseling programs deemed appropriate by the court, including counseling programs for perpetrators of 6 domestic abuse, alcohol abuse or abuse of controlled 7 substances; and 8

order other injunctive relief as the (7) 9 court deems necessary for the protection of a party, 10 including orders to law enforcement agencies as provided by 11 this section. 12

C. The order of protection shall contain notice 13 that violation of any provision of the order of protection is a violation of state law and that federal law, 18 U.S.C. 922, 15 et seq., prohibits possession of firearms by certain persons.

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D. If the order of protection supersedes or alters 17 prior orders of the court pertaining to domestic matters 18 between the parties, the order shall say so on its face. Ιf 19 an action relating to child custody or child support is 20 pending or has concluded with entry of an order at the time 21 the petition for an order of protection was filed, the court 22 may enter an initial order of protection, but the portion of 23 the order dealing with child custody or child support will 24 then be transferred to the court that has or continues to 25

1 have jurisdiction over the pending or prior custody or 2 support action.

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E. A mutual order of protection shall be issued only in cases where both parties have petitioned the court and the court makes detailed findings of fact indicating that both parties acted primarily as aggressors and that neither party acted primarily in self-defense.

F. No order issued under the Family Violence 8 Protection Act shall affect title to any property or allow a 9 party to transfer, conceal, encumber or otherwise dispose of 10 another party's property or the joint or community property 11 of the parties. 12

G. Either party may request a review hearing to amend an order of protection. An order of protection involving child custody or support may be modified without proof of a substantial or material change of circumstances.

н. An order of protection shall not be issued unless a petition or a counter petition has been filed."

SECTION 4. A new section of the Family Violence Protection Act is enacted to read:

"RELINQUISHMENT OF FIREARMS--PENALTY.--

A. After the court has issued notice that the 22 restrained party is subject to the provisions of Paragraph (2) of Subsection A of Section 40-13-5 NMSA 1978, 24 the restrained party shall relinquish all firearms in the

restrained party's immediate possession or control or subject 2 to the restrained party's possession or control in a safe 3 manner to a law enforcement officer, a law enforcement agency or federal firearms licensee within forty-eight hours of 4 service of the order. 5

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B. A law enforcement officer or law enforcement 6 agency shall take possession of all firearms subject to the 7 order of protection that are relinquished by the restrained 8 party or are in plain sight or are discovered pursuant to a 9 lawful search. 10

C. A law enforcement officer or law enforcement 11 agency that takes temporary possession of a firearm pursuant 12 to this section shall: 13

(1) prepare a receipt identifying all 14 firearms that have been relinquished or taken; 15

(2) provide a copy of the receipt to the 16 restrained party; 17

provide a copy of the receipt to the (3) 18 petitioner within seventy-two hours of taking possession of 19 the firearm; 20

(4) file the original receipt with the court 21 that issued the order of protection within seventy-two hours 22 of taking possession of the firearm; and 23

(5) ensure that the law enforcement agency 24 retains a copy of the receipt. 25

1 D. An order of protection issued pursuant to 2 Section 40-13-5 NMSA 1978 shall include: 3 (1)a statement that the restrained party shall not purchase, receive, transport, possess or have 4 custody or control of a firearm while the order of protection 5 is in effect; 6 (2) a description of the requirements for 7 8 the relinquishment of firearms as provided in this section; (3) a statement that within seventy-two 9 hours of the issuance of the order of protection the 10 restrained party must file with the court issuing the order: 11 (a) a receipt identifying all firearms 12 that have been relinquished or taken by a law enforcement 13 officer or law enforcement agency; or 14 (b) a declaration of 15 non-relinguishment; 16 (4) the expiration date of relinquishment; 17 the address of the court that issued the (5) 18 order of protection; and 19 (6) a statement that violation of any 20 provision of the order of protection is a violation of state 21 law and that federal law, 18 U.S.C. 922, et seq., prohibits 22 possession of firearms by certain persons. 23 Ε. If the respondent is present at the hearing on 24 the order of protection, the court shall provide the SJC/SPAC/SB 328 25 Page 12

respondent with a receipt form to identify all firearms to be
 surrendered or, if the respondent has no firearms to
 relinquish, a declaration of non-relinquishment. The court
 shall accept the completed form from the respondent for
 immediate filing.

F. Evidence establishing ownership or possession of a firearm pursuant to this section shall not be admissible as evidence in any criminal proceeding.

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G. The law enforcement agency or federal firearms
licensee with custody of a surrendered or seized firearm
shall make the firearm available to a formerly restrained
party within three business days of receipt of a request from
a formerly restrained party who is then currently eligible to
own and possess a firearm.

H. A formerly restrained party who has surrendered or had firearms taken by a law enforcement officer or law enforcement agency pursuant to this section who does not wish the firearm returned or who is no longer eligible to possess a firearm may sell or transfer the firearm to a federal firearms licensee. The law enforcement agency shall not release the firearm to a federal firearms licensee until:

(1) the federal firearms licensee has
displayed proof that the formerly restrained party has
transferred the firearm to the licensee; and

(2) the law enforcement agency has verified

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the transfer with the formerly restrained party.

2 I. A law enforcement agency holding a firearm 3 relinquished pursuant to this section may dispose of the firearm twelve months from the date of proper notice to the 4 formerly restrained party of the intent to dispose of the 5 firearm, unless another person claiming to be the lawful 6 owner presents written proof of ownership. If the firearm 7 8 remains unclaimed after twelve months from the date of notice, no party shall assert ownership and the law 9 enforcement agency may dispose of the firearm. For the 10 purposes of this subsection, "dispose" means to destroy a 11 firearm or sell or transfer the firearm to a federal firearms 12 licensee. 13

J. The provisions of this section shall not be interpreted to require a federal firearms licensee to purchase or accept possession of a firearm from a restrained party.

K. The administrative office of the courts shall develop a standard receipt form and declaration of non-relinquishment form for use under this section."

SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE.--The effective date of the provisions of this act is July 1, 2019.

"[<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] RELINQUISHMENT OF FIREARMS--PENALTY.--

A. After the court has issued notice that the restrained party is subject to the provisions of Paragraph (2) of Subsection A of Section 40-13-5 NMSA 1978, the restrained party shall relinquish all firearms in the restrained party's immediate possession or control or subject to the restrained party's possession or control in a safe manner to a law enforcement officer, a law enforcement agency or federal firearms licensee within forty-eight hours of service of the order.

B. A law enforcement officer or law enforcement agency shall take possession of all firearms subject to the order of protection that are relinquished by the restrained party or are in plain sight or are discovered pursuant to a lawful search.

C. A law enforcement officer or law enforcement agency that takes temporary possession of a firearm pursuant to

this section shall:

(1) prepare a receipt identifying all firearms that have been relinquished or taken;

(2) provide a copy of the receipt to the restrained party;

(3) provide a copy of the receipt to the petitioner within seventy-two hours of taking possession of the firearm;

(4) file the original receipt with the court that issued the order of protection within seventy-two hours of taking possession of the firearm; and

(5) ensure that the law enforcement agency retains a copy of the receipt.
